Parenting classes and the Ready for Kindergarten program have been the Hub's focus for school partnerships.

Describe any activities held with the objective of increasing children's school readiness

Eighteen Ready for Kindergarten workshops were held across the county at KPI elementary sites, the Salem-Keizer Teen Parent Program, a health care clinic in Woodburn and the Salem Public Library.

Describe any activities held with the objective of increasing parents' school involvement

In two parenting series, parents voiced concerns with an event that happened to their child at school. The facilitator passed the concern on to the school administration but encountered difficulty with the administration's expectation of the facilitator to diminish the parental concern. We will be exploring appropriate protocols with each of our districts to assure that parenting programs offered in school settings are considered as a valued means of gaining important parent perspectives and concerns.

Other school collaboration activities

At the final sessions of the Teen Parent Ready for Kindergarten we learned that the teen parent students highest attendance rates were on the days that the Ready Program was offered. The program was helping these teens reach their own education needs while preparing their babies to be ready for school in years ahead. A high school teacher with around 30 years of experience working with teen parents shared, "This was one of the most important things ever done for parents." She begged for us to do this every year!

Organization Capacity Narratives

Progress toward Logic Model or Program Goals:

Dedicate staff time to implementation of parenting education with related support from other hub programs: Spring term is peak seasons, so all Hub staff shared the fidelity site visits to parenting classes and the interns are entering the PSL evaluations to help the Parent Education Coordinator meet deadlines.
Parent Education Coordinator provides support to advisory groups, schedules train the trainer ops, and supports the facilitator network: The parent advisory group met twice this quarter, many in the facilitator network attended the OSU Conference, and work is underway to schedule two joint trainings with Polk/Yamhill and Incredible Years Infant/Toddler in the fall.

Sustainability Planning Activities:

The grant funds from the Coordinated Care Organization have allowed MPELH to add training and purchase curriculum. Parenting education is woven throughout the new MPELH strategic plan that was adopted by the Board during the past quarter.

Describe Any Changes in Staffing Patterns this Quarter:

Two new interns came on board in June to staff summer events and input KPI and OPEC participant evaluations.

Organizational Capacity Successes:

KPI coordinators were successful in working with assigned rural school districts to host parenting classes in the spring. A MPELH staff member working in a practicum assignment at a local pediatric clinic also helped the clinic partner with the Oregon Child Development Coalition to host two Mind in the Making parenting classes, one in English and one in Spanish.

Organizational Capacity Challenges:

Our facilitators are serving more families with involvement with the courts or with other high needs. We will be reaching out to the community to identify resources that we can help these families connect with while we provide them with a parent education/support group.

5,000 people see and hear about parenting education opportunities at community events: During spring quarter alone, 2,261 people had contact with the Hub at community events!

Describe Any Changes in Partnerships this Quarter:

The CCO 2.0 rebidding process is creating uncertainty about the continuation of the grants from the CCO and the Behavioral Health Care Network past December 2018. The budget planning for the Hub will take that possible reduction into account as we move into the new budget year.

Community Capacity Successes:

New partnerships have been built with the YMCA, the Salem Public Library, and Salem Clinic. Social media is being used effectively to increase class participation and traffic on-line to the Hub's website. Site visits to parenting classes are being conducted by all Hub staff to share the load and to broaden the team's understanding of key aspects of a quality parenting class.

Community Capacity Challenges:

Parenting classes hosted by KPI sites or other programs with specific clients can create confusion about who may attend the series. As a general rule, but not in all cases, any community member may attend a parenting class funded by MPELH.

As summer begins, we have only one evidence-based parenting class being offered that will meet some participants' court requirements. We will be exploring methods and incentives that could be used to have more programming offered in our "slow" season.

Parenting Education Programming Narratives

Progress toward Logic Model or Program Goals:

Offer a minimum of seven classes in the spring including rural communities with an average of 12 parents attending: 12 classes were offered during the past quarter, exceeding the number of classes by 5; however, the average parent attendance was 8.25, 3.75 below the target participation level.

Host evidence-based parenting series at the majority of KPI sites with pre-k activities for children taught by early learning staff: 17 KPI sites (15 in Marion and 2 in Polk) hosted evidence based parenting classes during the past 12 months with the pre-k children's activities.

Host a minimum of five opportunities for parenting education annually at non-school community sites: Two classes were held in churches, one at the YMCA, one at a community based organization and another at the site of the home visiting program.

Parenting Education Successes:

As a pilot project, MPELH approached the Salem-Keizer Teen Parent Program with an offer to provide the Ready for Kindergarten training for parents with children ages 0, 1, and 2. At the conclusion of the three-workshop series, the classroom teachers, the facilitators and the parents of these infants and toddlers all deemed the project a wonderful success. The following paragraph contains direct quotes from the Program Summaries returned to the Hub by the school administrators.

"Knowing these moms are getting the information about attachment while they are pregnant and the babies are still so littleâ€”the earlier, the better." "Hearing the parents (the day after the training) talk about interacting with their kids and significant other with the toys." "One of the parents was going through a hard time and had been pretty flat in her affect. I loved seeing her light up as she learned how to use the toys to teach her students." Student quote, "I can't wait for the next one!" "The high school teacher in this classroom has been working with teen parents in one district for around 30 years. She said this was one of the most important things ever done for parents. She begged for us to do this every year!"

Parenting Education Challenges:

Predicting parenting class registration and attendance is beyond the abilities of our crystal ball. First time classes offered in Aurora, Mt. Angel, and Scotts Mills had attendance of 7, 4, and 10 respectively. The smallest community had the highest attendance! To gain a foothold in these communities, each class persisted through the full series. The group in Aurora were very enthusiastic as have asked the school to continue the class in the fall.

End of Program Year Narratives

Lessons Learned:

- The coordinated care organization, local pediatric clinics, and Salem Hospital have each expanded their partnerships with MPELH this year, including funding, referrals, and logistics support. Health care providers have a growing interest in supporting children's social and emotional health and realize that working with parents is essential to making advances in this care. The health care community and the families they serve are experimenting with various means of offering classes and connecting their parents to these programs. Clinic space constraints do not permit parents being able to attend a program on-site; for this reason, the clinics must connect their parents with an external location and/or provider. We are also weaving health related topics, such as nutrition, dental care and safe sleep, into the Hub fidelity site visits to other parenting classes.
- Offering strong and varied curricula that includes messages that align with those conveyed by partner programs (including social services, education and health care sectors) helps generate high interest and willingness to host parenting programs. This high interest was an important factor that helped MPELH persuade many small communities to offer a class for the first time this year.
- Scheduling Challenges—the partnership between the OPEC Parenting Programs and the Kindergarten Partnership and Innovation Grant has garnered great parent education/family engagement programming with numerous schools across the county. Our education partners prefer offering parenting series during the winter and spring terms; this challenges the Hub's support systems for deploying facilitators, and in meeting the needs for curriculum and program oversight. It also creates circumstances in the summer and fall where parents who are seeking a parenting class are unable to find one in their community. We will be exploring methods used by other OPEC sites that balance program offerings throughout the year.
- This year we had a goal to offer more parent education opportunities in more rural communities. Specific outreach with organizations and facilitators was made so that we were able to increase our offerings to include Aurora, Scotts Mills, and Mt. Angel.
- Local elementary schools are finding parenting classes to be an effective way to engage families. The process for sharing parent concerns that are identified during parenting classes with school administrators has been informal and has occasionally placed the facilitator in situations where they need to share participant concerns with the contracting authority that hired them. The Hub will be working with the education community to develop protocols for facilitators and parents who identify issues. The protocol will address who the concern should be shared with and how school administrators could effectively listen to and resolve concerns.
- The Hub continues to fine tune its parenting series mini-grant; this process will be further refined by asking host sites to be specific on what is needed for hosting the series and who will be responsible for providing each need. Needs should include contract with trained facilitator, publicity and outreach for recruitment/retention, child care ratios, healthy meals/snacks, technology supports, insurance requirements, facility access, etc.
- As the Hub's group of trained facilitators has expanded and the number of parents participating in classes has grown, the need for a resource list/binder with provider information is seen as an effective tool that all facilitators could use to respond to family needs/questions that come up during classes.
- Parents are hesitant to sign up for a 10 to 14 week parenting class series. Promoting the classes as more a come-as-often-as-you-can and as a way to build a parent support community has worked for some sites. Other sites have recognized the benefits in starting small and a plan to grow as positive word spreads about the content and support. The Woodburn community started a parent-child play group to help build that support for families unable to afford preschool; the group provides early learning opportunities for the preschoolers and a support network for the parents.
- Together with our Coordinated Care Organization, for the second year, we disseminated kindergarten readiness calendars. We printed and distributed 18,000 calendars across schools, health care clinics, community events, and other programs. This calendar has allowed us a great way to connect with families at community events. In fact they were received so well, we will be doing this again for the 2018 school year and getting them to additional families served by even more partners.

Plans for the Coming Year:

- MPELH will be working with the OPEC hub for Polk and Yamhill to offer facilitator training for specific populations including parents of infants and toddlers, new/young dads, and families with special needs children.
- Through a contract with the Behavioral Care Network, the social emotional developmental needs of children will be woven into the work of the Hub with child care and preschool providers and in parent education programs. This initiative was developed because of the growing number of national and local reports about children who are unable to flourish in early childhood classroom settings because of disruptive behaviors. A new coordinator has been working with education, mental health and child care providers to determine classroom and parenting curricula to be used to support this work.
- Foster parents and grandparents who are parenting a second time around will also be a new group that the Hub works with in conjunction with the Department of Human Services. These legal guardians currently participate in general parenting classes, but have specific needs because of the higher incidence of adverse childhood experiences that have happened to the children in their care. This group will also be invited to participate in a "provider" edition of the Ready for Kindergarten curriculum, to update their knowledge of what a 5-year-old should know to be kindergarten-ready.
- A network of Parent Education Planners (PEP) will continue to meet quarterly to share successes and challenges, develop training schedules, and to collaborate on facilitator skill building. PEP identifies professional development topics to build facilitators' skills. The Parent Education Trainers (facilitators) also meet two to three times a year to expand facilitation skills during workshops and seminars. The goal is to provide access to training so that they can learn from each other on a myriad of topics. Basecamp is used as a communication platform for our facilitators to connect them with groups planning training, to share best practices, and to make community-wide announcements.
- MPELH will continue to actively participate in community events to share information about parent education, our website, and more. This has been a great way for us to connect with the community. During events, we offer families the opportunity to share with us their contact information.
- Facilitator skills will be strengthened by providing in-depth training and skill building workshops on a variety of adult learning and facilitation topics. The goal with this is for skill development and enhancement, as well as an opportunity to connect facilitators with their peers — whether urban/rural, employed/freelance facilitators. In addition, we will offer "refreshers" for facilitators who frequently train Make Parenting a Pleasure and Abriendo Puertas/Opening Doors in both English and Spanish. As part of this we will provide materials and/or curriculum that are fresh and professional.
- MPELH will continue to conduct site visits three times a series to ensure fidelity to the model, and the ability to offer coaching or technical assistance as needed. It also allows us to assure that the child activities are working well. These visits will be communicated with the facilitator in advance to ensure that each visit is a constructive supportive check-in.
